Since 1974, the Cheshire YMCA has been one of approximately 200 YMCAs supporting the International Division through technical and financial support, training workshops and seminars, as well as person to person exchanges with different cultures such as Japan, Ecuador, Nigeria, India, and the Sioux Indian.

Where do the funds go?

In the past monies raised by American Heritage Tour and New England Heritage Tour World Service projects, plus such fund-raising efforts of the Cheshire YMCA International Committee, funded the following:

- Sioux Indian YMCA Trip with Youth Assistance/Donation.
- Puttur, India: Computer training, eye clinics, photography classes, and tailoring and weaving instruction.
- Ibadan, Nigeria: Annual salary for program director. Financial aid for building a program center, which includes accommodations to house visiting YMCA personnel.
- Amman, Jordan: Support of the summer camping program for orphan Palestinian refugee camps.
- Bangkok YMCA: Protect a Child Project.
- In addition, the Cheshire YMCA International Committee provides funds each summer for the International Staff at Camp Takodah to experience some of our beautiful New England scenery and places of interest.
- In the future, development of teen partnerships/exchanges will be a goal.
- INTERACT Club Students from MRHS, Swanzey received a donation and also worked with NEHT S 2010 for a donation to build homes in El Salvador with the Elm City Rotary Club.
- Non perishable food items are donated to Gert's Pantry, Swanzey and The Community Kitchen, Keene by Developmental Travel Students.
- Requests were made and filled for critical medical supplies for Jeremy Young, a Senior Board Members Son Stationed in Afghanistan in February of 2011.
